During the month of November, the children took the time to think about their loved ones and the people we would like to remember in our thoughts and prayers. These were shared during our collective worship and displayed on our prayer tables and in the school hall.







In November our school took part in Anti-bullying week. The children learned/embedded their prior knowledge on what bullying is. The theme this year was 'reach out' and the children learned what they should do if they see, hear or experience bullying. All the children know that they should reach out to an adult (sooner rather than later) if they experience bullying, see bullying or hear about it. Our children understand that bullying is wrong and not acceptable.

Throughout the week the children across the school had different activities to support their learning. All the children and staff came together on odd socks day to celebrate the fact that we are all special and unique. It was fantastic to see all the children and staff taking part in a key activity.



#### **Reading News**

The past term has seen the children really engage with their reading. In October, we had a well attended Breakfast with Books, where parents and children got to enjoy reading together. They also enjoyed their end of term prizes, including Movie Afternoons, Pyjama Parties and an Afternoon Tea. This half term has seen the children try hard in their reading and many of them have met their target already. Well done to Ruru (St.Peter), Ysane (St. Joseph) and Jason (St. Augustine) who have already read over 600,000 words this year and are well on their way to becoming Word Millionaires. To close the term off, we had our first book swap in December, which was really well attended and the children were able to get new books to read over Christmas.





On the 10th November we had a 'Maths is everywhere' Day. For children's maths lesson that day, they looked at maths that they might use everyday day, not just in their maths lessons.

We had children looking at shopping catalogues and budgets; looking at symmetry in nature; looking at which shapes create strong and stable structures; the maths in the nursey rhyme 'Hickory dickory dock' and even looking at the maths involved in football and match reports. 
#### News from Year 3

In year 3 we have been learning about forces. We investigated how the surface of a ramp would affect the distance a toy car travelled. We did lots of measuring and our results showed that the bumpier the surface, the more friction it had, the shorter the distance the toy car would travel.

As a year group, we had our first walk to St Augustine's church to celebrate mass with the parish and Fr Emmanuel, the whole year did very well in walking quickly to get to mass on time and Ronel did us all proud reading the first reading so beautifully.

We really enjoyed our 'Maths is Everywhere' day in year 3. We looked at directions and moved around different activities; giving directions to a partner to move around the outside area, moving a programmable 'bee-bot' floor robot and using Purple Mash to direct around mazes using the words forwards, backwards, left, right, turn, diagonally.

In computing the children have put together their own sequence of code to run a short animated programme. The children are gaining confidence in using control and event blocks.



### News from Year 4

Y4 enjoyed working collaboratively to investigate how sound travels. They made walkie – talkies and then tested them out. The children discovered that their voices travelled better if the string was pulled taut. They learned that taut means stretched or pulled tight. What a great Science afternoon!



Year 4 enjoyed a wonderful day at Great Linford Manor Park, stepping back in time, investigating and learning about the past.

They completed many interactive activities from writing with ink and a feather quill to playing Victorian style outdoor games and tasting fruit tea. A fantastic day was had by all!



Back in October, Year 6 had a Victorian Day as part of their history topic on the Victorians.

Children went back in time and dressed as Victorians, got new Victorian names and all lessons where Victorian themed- drills, handwriting and looking at inventions during the Victorian era.





Just before we broke up for half term, Year 6 went on a trip to Whipsnade Zoo as part of their science and literacy learning. Children had a great time walking round and looking at the animals. We then had a session in the discovery centre which linked to our science learning of 'Adaption and inheritance'.

When we came back to school, children used their experience of being at Whipsnade to help them write a balanced argument on the title: 'Should animals be kept in captivity?'
